

Welcome

We are delighted to announce the launch of A New Direction's Primary Arts programme, which aims to increase access to high quality, inspiring arts, cultural and creative opportunities for children and staff in London's state primary schools and primary SEND settings.

The entire programme is offered free of charge to schools, helping to unlock the creative potential, cultural capital and skills of school staff and children. The programme offers opportunities to support wellbeing, confidence, personal interest, and professional development in a time of increasing pressures on schools and their staff.

The programme has five strands and schools can choose which of them to join. At the beginning of September, following a pilot that ran during the last academic year, our second cohort of teachers will embark on the Cultural Education Leadership Programme. Delivered in partnership with UCL Centre for Educational Leadership at the Institute of Education, this course supports mid-career teachers to act as leaders in cultural education.

The other four strands of **Primary Arts** begin activity from November 2024 and can be booked from 25 September. These include In-Schools Touring with performances and supporting pupil workshops, teacher CPD and classroom resources; Go & See with free access to cultural experiences across London for pupils in winter 2024 and summer 2025; Masterclasses on creative approaches to reader development, delivered in partnership with the Centre for Literacy in Primary Education for teachers; and free hands-on twilight Come & Try workshops delivered with the Crafts Council to explore a variety of craft disciplines and available to all school staff. These activities reflect the breadth and quality of London's incredible cultural offering, and we would like to thank all the cultural organisations who are partnering with us on project delivery.

Primary Arts will be delivered annually across three academic years from September 2024. Primary Arts is generously supported by The City of London Corporation City Educational Trust Fund (29084), a City of London Corporation charity, and we are incredibly grateful for their support at a time of significant pressure on the education and cultural sectors in London.

Primary Arts was created in response to the release in March 2023 of the Gulbenkian report The Arts in Schools - Foundations for the Future, a reflective piece that articulates the various barriers that have discouraged and disallowed cultural education and arts in schools to thrive. We hope that this three-year programme will be one of many that start to address the findings of this report. We are very excited by this opportunity to create new cultural and creative opportunities for primary school children and their teachers across London.

About the Programme

A New Direction's **Primary Arts** programme aims to increase access to high quality, inspiring arts, cultural and creative opportunities for children and staff in London's state primary schools and primary SEND settings.

Delivered in partnership with a range of cultural organisations, this menu of free opportunities for schools aims to unlock the creative potential, cultural capital and skills of school staff and children, offering opportunities to support wellbeing, confidence, personal interest and development.

In this brochure, you can find information about the following strands of the programme:

In–Schools Touring → a choice of ten arts performances and in–class workshops for your pupils, plus teacher CPD, a curated box of reading books and a selection of creative materials and resources.

Go & See → tickets for your pupils to experience theatre, film and the visual arts.

Masterclasses → CPD days exploring a range of creative approaches to literacy and reader development for teachers.

Come & Try → a series of creative practical twilights for all school staff.

Bookings

Each section of the brochure includes information on how to book or express your interest. All bookings are processed through our <u>online booking platform</u>. Each person booking to attend a Masterclass or Come & Try event must register on the booking platform under their school profile. For the In–Schools Touring programme and Go & See you will need to specify a lead teacher for us to liaise with. The entirety of the programme is offered free of charge, though charges may be made for late cancellations or no–shows.

Who can take part?

Primary Arts is open **to all state primary mainstream and special schools in London.** The programme is designed to include children in all primary year groups from Reception to Year 6.

Your school must be in a London borough to be eligible for the programme.

Schools and individuals can take part in more than one strand of the programme (but only one touring booking can be made per school).

Go & See is available to all eligible schools, however ticket numbers are limited.

Masterclasses are open to qualified teachers currently working at any level in eligible schools.

Come & Try twilights are open to any member of staff currently working in eligible schools, including teachers, Teaching Assistants, support staff, and admin staff.

An access budget is available to support engagement in this programme, for example for transport, BSL interpretation or other costs.

For the In–Schools Touring Programme and Go & See, if we receive more booking requests than we can accept to the programme, schools will be selected based on a range of criteria including level of need, geography, previous engagement in Primary Arts and the capacity of the programme itself. The Masterclasses and Come & Try programmes are offered on a first come, first served basis – we will open waiting lists for fully–booked sessions.

In-Schools Touring

The Primary Arts In–Schools Touring programme brings high quality arts experiences into your school through performances and workshops for pupils, supported by teacher CPD and a range of additional resources.

Ten organisations are working with us to deliver the programme – their offers are outlined in full on the pages that follow.

Participating schools receive:

- A performance (or experience) lasting around 1 hour, for all classes in one year group.
- An in-class workshop lasting 45 minutes to 1 hour, for each class in the same year group, that further explores the artform, themes and curriculum areas linked to the performance.
- A teacher twilight CPD session lasting 1 to 1.5 hours held in your school during the two weeks prior to the performance, to support preparation, whole–school engagement, and teacher and pupil learning.
- A range of resources to support communication and learning about the performance, including information for pupils, staff and families, and classroom activities.
- A box of creative materials to support creative classroom activities.
- **Booklists** linked to the programme, curated by the Centre for Literacy in Primary Education.
- A set of books worth around £150 to support reading for pleasure linked to the programme.

Access & Inclusion

Each offer is suitable for at least one Key Stage and can be adapted to work for pupils with additional needs whether in mainstream or SEND settings. Where needed, we will liaise with your school to ensure that the programme is inclusive for all your participating pupils.

Eligibility

Primary Arts is open to **all state primary mainstream and special schools in London**. The programme is designed to include children in all primary year groups from Reception to Year 6. Your school **must be in a London borough** to be eligible for the programme.

If your school or a member of your school staff is participating in another area of the Primary Arts programme, you are still eligible to make a booking request for this strand of the programme.

How to Make a Booking Request Only one In-Schools Touring booking will be considered per school per year.

There are places available for 100 schools on the In–Schools Touring programme in the first year. If you participated in the pilot of the In–Schools Touring programme in 2023/24, you are unlikely to be allocated a place on the programme this year.

Please read the offer descriptions carefully on the pages that follow, consider your school's needs and areas of interest, and identify your first and second choice of offer.

Each description includes year group suitability – please ensure the offer you are interested in is suitable for the year group you would like to take part.

When you are ready to make a booking request, please <u>log in to</u> <u>the booking platform</u>, select In—Schools Touring, and complete the booking request form. All booking requests must be submitted by 9am on Friday 18 October 2024.

The form asks for practical information as well as date availability and should take around 10 to 15 minutes to complete. Once you have submitted the booking request form, we will contact you by Monday 4 November to let you know whether we are able to offer your school a place on the programme and to move your booking forward, where relevant.

Please note that while the In–Schools Touring programme is free of charge to schools, we may charge a fee of up to £1,000 for cancellations with less than three weeks' notice prior to your performance (excluding school holidays). Animate Arts: The Cardboard Castle

Relevant areas of the National Curriculum:

Art & Design, PSHE, Improving Health and Wellbeing, Developing a Growth Mindset, British Values – Democracy.

About the show

"Welcome to our most noble Order of the Art–er in this beautifully decorated Great Hall in the Cardboard Castle. This is a special gathering of pupils, teachers and artists, who will be honoured and receive prestigious acknowledgements for their individual achievements, good character and creativity. Let the ceremony begin!"

Built in your school hall, the Cardboard Castle is a life-size art installation, made entirely from paper and cardboard. Pupils and teachers are invited to decorate the castle's Great Hall ready for a colourful ceremony, which will celebrate everybody's place in the castle community in full pomp, pageantry and kindness.



About the pupil workshops

Before visiting the Cardboard Castle, pupils and teachers will design and create their very own heraldry shield, inspired by their character, talents and achievements. In this crafty workshop participants will explore the brilliant materials of cardboard and paper, with the support of professional visual artists from Animate Arts.

Their hand–made creations will be essential preparations and decorations to bring along to the Cardboard Castle installation as they will play a part in the performance experience.



Teacher twilight CPD

The makers of the Cardboard Castle will share their knowledge, expertise, tips and tricks with teachers to help create extraordinary interactive environments for your classrooms and school. In this after–school workshop, staff will develop skills in cardboard sculpture and displays, and inspire all classes across the school to get involved in the Cardboard Castle project.

This is a fun, practical, hands—on CPD workshop, encouraging staff to be imaginative, problem—solve and work together to build and create their very own castle installation to use as a book corner/role—play area in the school.

Arvon: Creative Writing Day

Key Stage / Year Groups:

Key Stage 2, SEND.

Relevant areas of the National Curriculum:

English, particularly writing and speaking, Wellbeing, Developing a Growth Mindset, Enrichment Activities, Raising Attainment in Speaking and Listening.

About the show

Arvon is all about encouraging people to see themselves as writers. We believe writing creatively supports children to grow in confidence, improve writing skills and boost wellbeing. Your school will be partnered with professional writers for the day, who will perform their own work and support pupils to develop and perform theirs. The show will inspire pupils by lifting their written words off the page and bringing the year group together to celebrate their writing. It will take place after pupil workshops, bringing all pupils together for a final celebration, with spoken word performances from the professional writers followed by pupils taking to the stage to share their written pieces authored in the classroom workshops.



About the pupil workshops

Professional writers will lead creative writing workshops with your chosen classes. These workshops will offer your pupils the chance to try their hand at writing prose and poetry, with the writers ensuring that there are multiple points of entry for pupils of all abilities.



Teacher twilight CPD

Working with experienced creative writing facilitators, teachers will gain insight into teaching creative writing outside of the restrictions of the curriculum. You will come away with useful tips and resources for encouraging creativity in your pupils.

With whole-hearted participation, their joyful performances and workshops are designed to engage, inspire and delight. With a presence in 20 countries, they've brought laughter to more than 120,000 children.



Clowns Without Borders: Piranhas and Bananas

Key Stage / Year Groups:

Reception, Key Stage 1, Key Stage 2, SEND.

Relevant areas of the National Curriculum:

PSHE, British Values, Creativity, Wellbeing, Healthy Lifestyles, Environment, Developing a Growth Mindset, Pupil Voice.

About the show

Piranhas and Bananas is a joyful interactive show that was developed with Rohingya children in Bangladesh in 2019. It's filled with playful storytelling, physical comedy, silly walks, and even sillier noises. Flip Flop is working at Flannagan's Fish Sanctuary. She has great ideas for the vegetarian piranhas, but no one listens. Flip Flop enlists the help of her friends in the audience, proving that even unexpected heroes can make a big difference!



About the pupil workshops

Flip Flop is inspired by the imaginative ideas of children. They really help her out of some tight spots! She believes the world would be better if children were listened to more.

This lively workshop immerses children in playful storytelling and physical comedy, encouraging them to recreate moments from Flip Flop's adventure. It explores who gets to make decisions, what it feels like to be listened to, and how we can listen to one another to help all voices be heard. We'll finish by showcasing the children's ideas on how their voices can be better included in school.



Teacher twilight CPD

Express Your Selfie: This practical CPD guides teachers through creative exercises to boost pupil voice in and out of the classroom. Based on our work with children and insights from our board (ages 6–11), it focuses on engaging children to creatively share their thoughts, challenges, ideas, solutions, and aspirations.

Working with games, stories and movement, teachers will gain a deeper understanding of how to create more meaningful and engaging pupil voice experiences for the children and themselves.

Conductive Music: Mindful Soundscapes

Key Stage / Year Groups:

Key Stage 2, SEND.

Relevant areas of the National Curriculum:

Music, Science, Art & Design, Computing, Physical Education, Mental Health and Wellbeing, Developing a Growth Mindset, British Values, Raising Attainment in Speaking and Listening.

About the show

Mindful Soundscapes fosters creativity and mindfulness among pupils through an artistic installation on climate change, upcycling, and environmental awareness. The interactive performance features a live plant set connected via TouchMe and MakeyMakey technology. Three trees, representing the Three Gods, narrate a story partly generated by pupils and inspired by Greek, Norse, and Southeast Asian mythology. The stage setup includes found materials and upcycled props, integrating mental health and mindfulness themes through tactile and sensory experiences and deeply engaging pupils in environmental sustainability.



About the pupil workshops

In the workshop, pupils create an immersive environment by experimenting with MakeyMakey technology, blending creativity and scientific understanding. They build interactive bio-sculptures from tin foil and other materials, contributing to different parts of a story. These bio-sculptures form a garden orchestra, triggering natural sounds like birds, wind, and water. Movement activities involve mimicking natural shapes and contributing to the narrative, fostering physical engagement and environmental connection. Pupils recreate the environment through group storytelling, enhancing their collaborative skills and creative thinking.



Teacher twilight CPD

Our teacher twilight CPD session aims to boost non–specialist teachers' confidence in delivering the National Plan for Music Education. It integrates creativity, music–making, and environmental awareness into teaching practices. The session includes vocabulary–building story games, soundscape design, and introductions to digital tools like Google Arts and Culture and Sampler Apps. These activities enhance storytelling and vocabulary skills, provide practical experience in music technology, and familiarise teachers with digital tools for creative projects.

Embracing Arts: Roll Up, Roll Up

Reception, Key Stage 1, SEND – including Key Stage 2 in SEND settings

Relevant areas of the National Curriculum:

Arts and Creativity, Mental Health and Wellbeing, Communication, Speaking, Listening & Engagement, British Values – Individual Liberty.

About the show

Embracing Arts welcomes you to the big top – except we've lost all of our performers! We need YOUR PUPILS to entertain and show off their circus skills! Dazzle at our daring lion tamers, become tenacious tightrope walkers, show off your stealth as strong men and women, be amazed at acrobats who will throw themselves through a ring of fire! Cry with laughter at crazy, clumsy clowns. Let's make this the GREATEST SHOW your school has ever seen!



About the pupil workshops

Through the workshops, we delve deeper into sensory exploration and creating sensory theatre, as well as giving each pupil an opportunity to access all the sensory props featured in our show. Pupils are encouraged to learn a new skill such as plate spinning – requiring hand–eye coordination and balance. We also look at communication, and how we can include both verbal and non–verbal learners by exploring physicality, keyword signing and other sensory approaches to make learning a fully inclusive experience.



Teacher twilight CPD

The CPD will prepare staff for the approach that Embracing Arts uses for multi–sensory learning. There will be practical elements of using 'everyday' items in new ways to create an immersive, accessible learning strategy. We will explore how we can bring core subjects to life through the techniques of performance and sensory engagement. We will also give a focus to keyword signing and Social and Visual Stories to show how we, and the staff, can prepare learners to access this subject.

emma + pj: The Shivers

Key Stage / Year Groups:

Key Stage 2, SEND.

Relevant areas of the National Curriculum:

PSHE and Online Safety.

About the show

The Shivers is a high–octane action–comedy for young audiences about spies, lies, and learning to trust your gut. A fox, a pigeon, and a rookie agent are on a mission to save the world – but everything is not what it seems. Exploring themes of trust, authority, and friendship, The Shivers is a dynamic and accessible parable about living in the age of misinformation. Blending live music, dance, video, and physical comedy, the show is a feast for the senses that pushes the boundaries of performance in primary settings.



About the pupil workshops

This creativity workshop led by writer/directors Emma Clark and PJ Stanley encourages collaboration, play, and self–reflection. Each hands–on workshop will feature activities bringing to life the world of The Shivers and its core themes, including:

- World Building: designing heroes and villains, from Eye Spies to Miss Information's minions.
- Design: creating tin foil disguises and exploring how they make us move and interact.
- Performance: devising short scenes, emphasising collaboration and improvisation.

The workshop is designed to lift the lid on different types of creativity and can be tailored to the specific needs and interests of each class.



Teacher twilight CPD

This energetic CPD session takes the form of a creativity lab, bringing together teachers with devised theatre makers to explore a range of tools for tackling complex themes and subject matter through collaboration and play. Using The Shivers Creativity Pack as a jumping off point, teachers will respond to playful quick–fire devising prompts drawn from the world and themes of the show, getting on their feet and exploring through doing. Teachers will build confidence in using alternative approaches to enliven their classrooms, inspire the imaginations of their pupils, and think outside the box.

About the show

Gertie is great at being THE LITTLEST YAK, with the CURLIEST, WHIRLIEST wool and the GRIPPIEST of hooves for clip-clopping up cliffs. Only, Gertie doesn't want to be the littlest. She's in a rush to grow up and be just like THE BIG YAKS. But what if there are some things that only a GERTIE can do?

LAStheatre bring The Littlest Yak to the stage in spectacular fashion. Join them for a dazzling adventure, into the heart of the Himalayas. A gorgeous story celebrating YOU being perfect...just the way you are!



About the pupil workshops

Our workshops for Reception and KS1 will focus on using drama games and arts activities to develop confidence and celebrate the things that make each of us unique.

For KS2 we will cover the same ground whilst also providing an introduction to puppetry – creating simple tabletop puppets together.



Teacher twilight CPD

In the twilight CPD, we will explore the principals of using play in learning, as well as building on creative skills already familiar to teachers across primary to support different learning outcomes. We will also share flexible and adaptable games that we use in our creative practice and that can be adapted to energise or shake up dull or tricky topics.

This CPD was first developed as part of Creative Connections, a collaboration between LAStheatre and schools across the Isle of Sheppey, delivered in partnership with ICON and The Royal Opera House.

Mbilla Arts: Routes to Rhythm

Key Stage / Year Groups:

Key Stage 1, Key Stage 2, SEND.

Relevant areas of the National Curriculum:

Music, Physical Education, PSHE.

About the show

Led by master drummers from West Africa and accompanied by highenergy dancers, this performance explores the origins of West African music and dance styles, tracing its journey from the African Continent across the Atlantic to the Caribbean and influencing carnival celebrations in the UK today.

The first segment delves into the roots of West African music, showcasing the powerful beats of the djembe drum. As the performance progresses, the narrative shifts to depict the movement of these musical styles showcasing African People's Dance. The interactive call and response elements keep the young audience engaged and excited.



About the pupil workshops

The supporting workshop includes an opportunity to learn to play the djembe drum and experience the interaction between the drum and the dance. For the first part of the workshop children learn basic drumming patterns on djembe drums and practice call and response with drums.

The second part of the workshop involves step-by-step teaching by experienced dance teachers of African People's Dance accompanied by live drumming. At the end there is an opportunity for solo performances within the group to round off the workshop in an atmosphere of carnival celebration with drumming and Soca music.



Teacher twilight CPD

The CPD will provide teachers with a concise, engaging introduction to West African music and dance as well as influences on dance styles in the Caribbean and UK, equipping them with practical skills and ideas to integrate into their teaching. The session will include:

- Interactive exercise: call and response with drummer and participants using body percussion and voice.
- Delivery of West African Dance and Soca: dance styles by experienced Dance Teacher Alison Ray with a step-by-step teaching of basic dance movements.

Musiko Musika: From the Incas to Silicon Valley in Music

Key Stage / Year Groups:

Key Stage 1, Key Stage 2, SEND.

Relevant areas of the National Curriculum:

Music, Geography, Modern Foreign Languages, Science, Raising Attainment in Speaking and Listening, Art & Design, PSHE, British Values, Wellbeina.

About the show

Musiko Musika's visit to your school will start with a performance presenting a sequence of musical pieces illustrating the musical styles, instruments, and cultural history of Spanish speaking Latin America. Along the way pupils will learn about different instruments including from the indigenous ancient Incas, and the musical and cultural impact of the European colonisers and of the Africans brought to South America by the slave trade.

Led by key performers from the group Quimantu, these exceptional musicians will be playing a wonderfully diverse selection of stringed, wind and percussion instruments from around the world.



About the pupil workshops

The workshop will give pupils hands—on experience of some of the instruments, taking them on a journey from the Incas to Silicon Valley by introducing pupils to today's world of music technology. Pupils learn to sing a song in Spanish and English and to play a simple melodic line using our specially designed panpipes. Based on a pentatonic scale, our unique "pentasikus" utilise the traditional method of playing panpipes, with pupils working together to play them in pairs. The final stage will integrate these ancient music making techniques with pupils utilising Andean sampled instruments through MIDI controlled music software.



Teacher twilight CPD

The CPD session is designed to inform teachers, prepare them for the performance and workshop visit and give them the skills and knowledge to utilise the follow–up resources effectively across the whole school. It will also familiarise staff with the background context of the musical and cultural content pupils will encounter, enabling them to engage participating classes and the wider school community with what our programme offers. Each school will be provided with four sets of pentasikus to keep and use for the follow–up activities as well as access to Musiko Musika's digital resources.

The Postal Museum: The Jolly Postman

Step inside a much-loved story in an interactive show to help The Jolly Postman deliver the post for fairy tale characters.



The Postal Museum: The Jolly Postman

Key Stage / Year Groups:

Reception, Key Stage 1, SEND.

Relevant areas of the National Curriculum:

Literacy, Understanding the World, Communication and Language, PSHE.

About the show

Step inside the much–loved story by Janet and Allan Ahlberg in this lively literacy mission to help The Jolly Postman collect, sort and deliver the post. This interactive performance brings fairy–tale land to life in a series of magical deliveries. Pupils become a team of jolly posties using postal props, song, rhyme and Makaton signs to experience the magic of sending and receiving letters, parcels and postcards. The show is designed to support literacy learning and connects to topics across the curriculum.



About the pupil workshops

This workshop puts the fictional story into a real–life context. At the end of the performance, the pupils receive a mystery delivery revealing their next mission. Back in the classroom, jolly posties put what they have learned into action to sort and send letters at sorting stations. The workshop introduces pupils to various kinds of post, develops reading and writing skills and understanding of writing for different purposes. At the end, pupils will write their own letters or postcards for The Jolly Postman.



Teacher twilight CPD

Led by Rosie Tells Tales, Schools and Early Years Programme Producer at The Postal Museum and an experienced storyteller and learning producer, this CPD provides a taster of the performance and the opportunities to link postal themes and creative literacy learning. Teachers will build a toolkit of approaches for a class topic based on the book.

Go & See

The Primary Arts Go & See programme offers a range of opportunities for pupils and their teachers to experience theatre, film and visual arts in London.

This programme gives pupils and staff in one year group per school the opportunity to experience the arts within venues rather than at school. It also aims to support teachers to connect these experiences to classroom learning, through online CPD sessions. The programme has two seasons: Winter 2024 and Summer 2025.

For the Winter season of Go & See, schools can apply for tickets from a choice of five different theatre productions, and one immersive art installation. For the Summer season of Go & See, schools can apply for tickets from a range of film, theatre and visual art options. The Summer season will open for bookings in Spring 2025.

Please note that there is a limited number of tickets available per performance. We will try to allocate tickets to as many schools as possible but it may not be possible for us to accommodate every booking request we receive.

Schools will

- Receive tickets for a theatre performance, gallery visit or cinema screening in London for all classes in one Year Group.

Access & Inclusion

An access budget will be available to support participant engagement in this programme, for example towards transport, additional staff or other costs.

Eligibility

The Primary Arts Go & See programme is open to state primary and primary SEND settings in London. The programme aims to support pupils' personal enjoyment, wellbeing and enrichment through the arts, as well as supporting their learning through CPD for teachers.

Your school **must be in a London borough** to be eligible for the programme. 





- Look at ways to engage children with a variety of poetic styles and forms through a range of creative approaches.
- Investigate how poetry supports the development of reading fluency.
- Use poetry to support pupils to respond to texts at a greater depth and develop deeper levels of inference when reading.
- Learn how to use poetry to develop and extend vocabulary and comprehension of language across the curriculum.
- Look at ways to help children foster their own authentic voices through writing poetry.
- Explore ideas and activities designed to support children to write effectively to make impact on the reader.

Takeaway

All participants will gain expert insights from the CLPE's Power of Poetry research project, a free copy of CLPE's Poetry: What We Know Works booklet, as well as receiving a poetry collection for each primary phase (EYFS, KS1 and KS2) to help with the immediate implementation of the day's training. Resources provided will including teaching plans to support schools in providing a range and breadth of poetry as children move through the Early Years and Primary phases.



All activities are designed to sit within core curriculum teaching and learning, targeting National Curriculum and Early Years Statutory Framework objectives and eliciting higher quality learning outcomes for all pupils.

We will explore narrative, character and worlds within the story to unlock learning potential through the usage of 3D learning strategies.

We will provide tools that can be used time and again in order to bridge cultural and experiential gaps, ensuring that the provision is accessible and inclusive to all.

We will explore how to develop and draw upon an extended unit of work inspired by a high–quality text that will support improved attainment in literacy and support thinking skills and creativity across the curriculum.




- · Why, when and how to use drama to engage with any area of learning.

- Practices that empower children with a confidence and ownership and lead to curious, engaged and motivated writers who work collaboratively, individually and independently.
- Activities that ensure enhanced language and vocabulary acquisition, engagement with the world and the development of imaginative ideas.

Access & Inclusion

These twilights will take an inclusive approach and are suitable for teachers, Teaching Assistants and support staff working in state primary mainstream and SEND settings. An access budget is available to support participant engagement in this programme, for example for transport, BSL interpretation or other costs.

Eligibility

Primary Arts Come & Try twilights are aimed at staff working in **any role** in state primary mainstream and special schools in London. This may include teachers, Teaching Assistants, SENDCOs, support staff, and admin staff. The programme is designed to support your own personal enjoyment and enrichment through the arts, as well as supporting learning.

Your school **must be in a London borough** to be eligible for the programme.

If your school or a member of your school staff is participating in another area of the Primary Arts programme, you are still eligible to take part in this strand of the programme. **Places will be limited to two participants per school** for any given session.

Liaqat works with paper for its intrinsic and functional qualities, creating collages that combine ephemera, mark making, and stitching. Work spontaneously with Liaqat and develop your own approaches to collage that you can use to support classroom learning.

Detail of activity

In this session you'll learn a variety of responsive and quick–thinking exercises that will get you pleating, scrunching, wrapping, and layering materials. You'll develop your practical making skills, building and embellishing your collage with a range of techniques with a focus on creating a landscape collage to take home with you.

During the session you'll have a chance to apply Crafts Council's Make First Pedagogy: dive straight into making and learn how makers respond to materials and their properties to create new works. The workshop will explore ideas around sustainable craft, making use of recycled materials in a way that is easily replicated in the classroom.

You'll use a range of natural materials to bring colour to your work. Take part for your own enrichment, while also learning how to use your new-found skills to support classroom learning.

Detail of activity

From salvaging onion skins to using naturally occurring pigments, you'll explore colour in this hands–on workshop. You'll have a chance to apply Crafts Council's Make First pedagogy: diving straight into making and using materials to develop your ideas. You'll then work with Alice to try the different dyeing and colouring techniques she uses in her work.

Woo Jin's work explores personal myth–making and storytelling. By mixing new and found materials, Woo Jin communicates this imaginary worldview, through her tactile language. Develop your own language of making and create a piece to take home. Take part for your own enrichment, while also learning how to use your new–found skills to support classroom learning.

Details of activity

Through the session you will learn a variety of textile techniques including embroidery and appliqué and develop your practical making skills, leaving with some textile pieces that you've made yourself.

Ella will share her practice as a material designer and artist who creates material explorations that straddle collectable design and visual art. Learn how to use found objects and remnants as materials to make something new. Take part for your own enrichment, while also learning how to use your new-found skills to support classroom learning.

Details of activity

Through the exploration of found objects including fragments of ceramic, trinkets and gems, shells and other natural materials, you will create a 3D object which reflects your own story and creative vision. You'll have a chance to apply Crafts Council's Make First pedagogy: diving straight into making and using materials to develop your ideas. You'll then use assemblage techniques to create your object, playing with shape, form and decoration.



Jacky creates sculptural pieces that combine the heaviness of blacksmithing with the refinement and delicacy of jewellery work. Jacky's work combines composition using line, space and shadows with work that tells a story and sparks conversation. You'll use a range of metal pieces, wire, and off cuts to bring your ideas to life. Take part for your own enrichment, while also learning how to use your new-found skills to support classroom learning.

Details of activity

Get creative using the everyday material of metal. You'll have a chance to apply Crafts Council's Make First pedagogy: diving straight into making and using materials to develop your ideas. You'll then work with Jacky to create and refine your ideas, learning some of the techniques she uses in her work.

In this fun and enriching workshop, participants will experience working responsively with materials and create a unique decorative object that they can take home.

He is an advocate of cross–arts collaboration and craft in education. He is the co–founder and director of Clayground Collective and teaches on the BA Ceramic Design course at Central Saint Martins.

Get messy with clay and create a piece of work to take home with you. Take part for your own enrichment, while also learning how to use your new–found skills to support classroom learning.

Details of activity

We will explore clay using accessible techniques – pinch, coil, slab – which can be combined to create a range of objects and shapes. In addition to making these works, you'll be encouraged to respond to the materials with a range of decorating techniques to mark the surface of your work. We will use economical materials to explore a variety of outcomes that can be replicated in school, whether or not you have access to a kiln.

We will look at how to recycle clay and look at projects where the learning is explorative, collaborative and ambitious!
